After so many experiences of helping people rebuild their lives after the devastation. I wanted to continue this work, leading me to become a Young Adult Volunteer (YAV). This was a one-year commitment through the P.C. (U.S.A.). I thought a mission trip that lasted a year would be incredible! In college, I went from rebuilding houses to wanting to rebuild cities by making them more accommodating to all their citizens and assisting cities in making long-term strategic plans that would benefit everyone, including people on the periphery of the community. This desire led me to choose a double major in Political Science and Public Administration to be educated and equipped to fulfill this goal.
